## History of Handel's Messiah

- George Frideric Handel born in Germany, studied in Italy, performed in England...
- Notoriety in early 20s, but health issues zapped strength/creativity in mid-life.
- Letter from friend (Charles Jennens) sparked three week sketch of Messiah score...
- April 13, 1742 debuted Messiah in Dublin...
- An oratorio about Jesus using Scripture as song lyrics...
- 3 Part breakdown of this Biblical beat...
